**INFORMATION CALENDAR**

**ANNUAL WATER QUALITY REPORTS**

**SUMMARY:**

The State of California requires that public water systems deliver an annual water quality report, also known as a Consumer Confidence Report (CCR), to their customers on an annual basis. The CCR, due by July 1 each year, summarizes the quality of water served to customers for the prior calendar year. The CCR consists of required text describing the source of water supplies, how consumers can be involved in decisions regarding their water, what kind of natural elements may be present in water sources, definitions, etc. Where required, the text is also provided in Spanish. The text is accompanied by a table that contains the average level and the range of constituents detected in the water supplies. CCRs include information on groundwater supplies, as well as imported supplies through the Metropolitan Water District.

As part of the Title 22 Monitoring Program, Central Basin offers to prepare CCRs for purveyors. Historically, most purveyors take advantage of this service. Staff has prepared the 2004 CCRs for the following 27 purveyors:

Eight purveyors had water quality results that exceeded one primary health related regulatory limit. Fourteen purveyors exceeded one or more secondary regulatory limit, which are set for aesthetic quality only and do not affect public health. Manganese and iron were the most commonly exceeded regulatory limit. Both constituents are naturally found in groundwater throughout the region.
